And while every picture tells a story, local artist Yehimi Cambron paints a story that we feel is worth sharing.

>> My name is Yehimi Cambron, and I am living in Atlanta.

I am an artist.

I'm an activist, and I'm a public speaker, and my work focuses on celebrating the resilience, the humanity, and the contributions of immigrants.

I was actually born in Mexico.

And when I was 7 years old, my parents made the courageous decision to uproot. I grew up undocumented and didn't really fully understand what that meant until I won third place for an art contest and was denied the \$50 prize because I didn't have a Social Security Number.

I felt like I did something wrong, like something was wrong with me.

Like, I was a failure.

Being undocumented has continued to be a challenge throughout my life because there's always this uncertainty.

One of the biggest fears for me is that fear of being separated from my family.

I'm currently actually a DACA recipient.

It gives you, for two years, a work permit.

So you're legally able to work.

DACA opened so many doors for me and created opportunities for so many of us.

I think it gave the country an opportunity to see us.

So in 2017, I painted my first mural.

There were all these artists that were coming from outside of my community to paint murals about my community.

And I was, like, oh, my God.

I'm right here.

So instead of whining, I decided to participate in the community conversations.

With one of the artists that was coming to my neighborhood because I wanted to be part of the project really badly.

That's how I became a muralist.

A year later, I was one of the selected artists that painted murals for a project that happened in Atlanta leading up to the Super Bowl.

That was basically a chance for us to show the country and the world who we are as a city and our legacy and our history of civil rights and social justice through the stories of immigrants that live in Atlanta.

It's important that I take the time to have conversations with people and hear their stories.

Like, who is still missing from this conversation?

When one of us starts to understand the value in our lived experiences, we start to unlearn all the stories that have been fed to us about us.

The more connected we are across the country, the stronger we are.

I have to tell you, I claim Atlanta wherever I go.

I'm super proud of my city and how it's embraced my work.

The city has had my back through all of this.

We're doing big things down here.

And so I hope people are inspired to come and visit and check out all our beautiful, beautiful murals.

>> We asked Yehimi to help shine a spotlight on a deserving local business.

She put the Real Mexican Vittles at the top of her list.
